"A Dark Side of Social Capital? Kinship, Consumption, and Savings"*

We explore if traditional sharing norms in kinship networks are associated with consumption and accumulation decisions of poor black households in Kwazulu-Natal, South Africa. Our results are consistent with the interpretation that households try to evade their "sharing obligations" by (i) accumulating durables that are non-sharable at the expense of durables that may be shared, (ii) increasing consumption of non-durables, and (iii) reducing savings in liquid assets. By attenuating accumulation incentives, kinship sharing may come at the expense of income growth — if so, a culturally-induced poverty trap can possibly eventuate. We demonstrate tentative evidence that more extensive kinship networks are associated with lower incomes, especially for the subsample of households that is relatively well off.

"What Drives Individual Willingness-to-pay for Climate Protection?"*

The willingness of citizens to bear the economic sacrifices required for mitigating climate change is a key policy question. Prior studies on the willingness-to-pay (WTP) for climate protection (mostly contingent valuation studies) indicate that people may in general support ambitious goals in climate policy. We design a field experiment employing a large representative sample to shed light on the nature of this WTP. The literature on pro-social behavior and public goods provides various motivational drivers to consider for contributions over and above Nash. We build a model of preferences accounting for motives such as altruism, 'warm glow' of giving, image motivation, justice perceptions, and moral obligation. This guides the experimental disentangling and quantification of the "motivational microstructure" in WTP for climate protection.
