

"Factor State-Space Models for High-Dimensional Realized Covariance Matrices of Asset Returns"\*

We propose a flexible matrix-variate state-space model for the prediction of highdimensional covariance matrices of asset returns based on observable common factors such as the three Fama- French factors. In this model the latent joint covariance matrix of the assets and the common factors is observed through the corresponding realized covariance matrix with a measurement density which is assumed to be a central Wishart. By imposing a factor structure the covariance matrix of the assets is decomposed into a low-rank component driven by the covariance matrix of the factors and a diagonal residual covariance matrix. In this decomposition we allow for dynamic variation in the factor and residual covariance as well as in the factor loadings. This decomposition translates into a convenient factorization of the Wishart measurement density which greatly simplifies statistical inference in highdimensional applications. The proposed model can be analyzed using Bayesian MCMC procedures and exploiting computational parallelization techniques enables a fast, scalable and numerically precise statistical inference. An empirical application to realized covariance matrices for 60 NYSE traded stocks shows that the model performs very well in- and out of sample.

"Foreign aid and judicial autonomy"

Foreign aid donors increasingly embrace judicial autonomy as an important component of advancing democracy and promoting investment abroad. Recipient governments also recognize the importance of judiciary reform for improving the investment climate at home. However, developing countries often lack the necessary state capacity that would enable them to implement these reforms. We argue that recipient countries that lack state capacity to undertake reforms on their own to turn to donors who readily assist in judiciary reforms via targeted democracy and governance interventions. At the same time, we suggest that the external assistance matters less for recipients that are able to implement judical reforms by themselves. We employ an instrumental variable model to test this argument in a global sample of aid-eligible countries.
